


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Don't Let Survivors Endure Abuse

Advocating for Child Safety at the Supreme Court




After the Court of Appeal declined to hear our writ petition -- a kind of fast track appeal -- challenging an order giving joint legal and physical custody to our client's abusive husband, <u>FVAP</u> filed a petition for review at the California Supreme Court. Petitions for review at the Supreme Court level very rarely move forward, but we are optimistic because the court asked the husband for an answer to our petition which is unusual.

In this case, despite a domestic violence restraining order, and the husband admitting to some of the abuse, the trial court granted joint custody without first finding that the husband could safely parent, which is required by the law. Because people who abuse their partners often use joint custody to continue abusive behavior at the expense of their children's best interests, we are hopeful this is the first step toward reversing the joint custody order.

Our petition to the Supreme Court detailed the importance of applying California's strong domestic violence laws that, when applied, give parents with a history of abuse a roadmap to the kind of accountability and treatment needed in order to be a safe parent, such as successful completion of a batterer's intervention program; treatment for alcohol or drug abuse, where appropriate; completion of parenting classes; compliance with restraining orders and otherwise taking steps to be able to put their children's best interests before a need to continue exercising control over their former partner.

Resource Spotlight: A Domestic Violence-Informed Guide on Tenants' and Landlords' Rights and Responsibilities



Survivors of domestic violence can face an **added barrier to safety when it comes to housing**, especially when landlords are not current on the specific housing protections afforded to survivors.

In order to help educate both landlords and tenants on these protections, <u>FVAP</u> collaborated with other legal services providers and the California Department of Real Estate to update the <u>newly released</u> <u>guide on residential tenants' and landlords' rights and responsibilities</u>. Our focus was to include the legal rights and responsibilities of survivor-tenants and their landlords in the handbook in order to help survivors obtain and keep safe housing all over California.

We are grateful to have had the opportunity to contribute to this important resource and are hopeful that getting this information out there will make it easier for survivors to stay safe and housed.
